
Financial help in the Sixth Form-could you claim the Bursary??

In order to work with students' responsibly, successful candidates will be provided with safe guarding training.



Donald Trump comes to the United Kingdom (Metro newspaper)

Donald Trump will leave the UK on Sunday morning after a historic visit that has given us some lasting memories. After a packed four-day stay, with two spent on his private golf resort in Scotland, the US president and wife Melania are set to fly to Finland where he will meet Russian President Vladimir Putin.

Mr Trump was met with mass protests at almost every location he visited during his highly controversial trip. More than 100,000 people are estimated to have



shown up to a protest in London London's streets were filled with protesters against Trump's visit to the UK He even avoided central London after tens of thousands of people marched through the city in protest.

The president and his wife were not offered a state visit, which would have seen them staying in Buckingham Palace as the Queen's guests, but instead this was classed as a working visit as he met with Theresa May to hash out the finer details of the UK's future with the US. Even Mr Trump admitted that he felt 'unwelcome' as he arrived. More than 100,000 people are estimated to have been involved in the march through the capital, and on a week day no less. A six metre Donald Trump baby blimp flew over Parliament Square
